The few weeks prior to STAAR and EOC testing is a critical time for students and teachers. Here are 5 Tips to having a successful STAAR Review:

1. Emphasize The Readiness Or High Yield Standards

2. Practice Questions With A Twist

All teachers with there students to practice STAAR questions. Instead of just handing them worksheets with test questions, create a gallery walk or an activity that allows the student to discuss the question, the answer choices, and the stimulus used in the question. Allowing students to have these discussion will help them develop and use meaningful test taking strategies.

3. Mix It Up—Provide a Variety of Strategies And Activities

Provide activities and use strategies that are meaningful to your content and to your students. By using activities and strategies students are able to step away from work-sheets and to truly engage in the learning. Hands on learning is crucial to making content concrete. When Mixing It Up, learning stations can be very engaging for students.

4. Incorporate Small Groups

Small groups are valuable as they allow teachers to work more closely with each student, and allows the opportunity for teachers to personalize instruction for that group. Small groups also allows peer tutoring to happen. Sometimes when a student explains a concept to another student it then clicks for them because they speak the same age language.

5. Use Teamwork And Have Fun

Games and teamwork are important during this time. Sometimes educators forget students are feeling the same pressure they are. Teamwork, games, and having fun allows students the opportunity to collaborate with engagement. These conversations between students are critical for some to finally make that concrete connection with the content.
